

BAY COUNTY PARENTING POLICY
Holiday Parenting Time

The holiday schedule takes precedence over any other regular parenting schedule of the child(ren), regardless of their ages.

1. In odd-numbered years the mother shall have the following holidays:
 - a. Thanksgiving from 6 p.m. on Wednesday until 6 p.m. on Friday if it is not the parent's regular parenting time weekend, and from 6 p.m. on Wednesday until 6 p.m. on Sunday if it is the parent's regular parenting time weekend.
 - b. Christmas Day from December 24 at 9 p.m. until December 25 at 9 p.m.
 - c. Child(ren)'s birthday(s) for a minimum of three hours on school days and a minimum of six hours on non-school days. Birthday parenting time shall include siblings.
2. In odd-numbered years the father shall have the following holidays:
 - a. Easter from 9 a.m. until 7 p.m.
 - b. Christmas Eve from December 23 at 6 p.m. until December 24 at 9 p.m.
 - c. Halloween from 4 p.m. until 8 p.m.
3. In even-numbered years the mother shall have the following holidays:
 - a. Easter from 9 a.m. until 7 p.m.
 - b. Christmas Eve from December 23 at 6 p.m. until December 24 at 9 p.m.
 - c. Halloween from 4 p.m. until 8 p.m.
4. In even-numbered years the father shall have the following holidays:
 - a. Thanksgiving from 6 p.m. on Wednesday until 6 p.m. on Friday if it is not the parent's regular parenting time weekend, and from 6 p.m. on Wednesday until 6 p.m. on Sunday if it is the parent's regular parenting time weekend.
 - b. Christmas Day from December 24 at 9 p.m. until December 25 at 9 p.m.
 - c. Child(ren)'s birthday(s) for a minimum of three hours on school days and a minimum of six hours on non-school days. Birthday parenting time includes siblings.
5. Mother's Day. Each year the mother shall have Mother's Day from 9 a.m. until 7 p.m.
6. Father's Day. Each year the father shall have Father's Day from 9 a.m. until 7 p.m.
7. Memorial Day/Labor Day. The child(ren) shall remain with the parent exercising the regular weekend schedule until 7 p.m. on these days.

A holiday that falls on a weekend should be spent with the parent who is supposed to have the child(ren) for that holiday. However, the balance of the weekend is to be spent with the parent who would normally have the child(ren) for that weekend.
