GODDEYNE GIVES WANTS ON PICTURES

Ts All Factors To Be Considered In Selection

No picture should be purchased without consideration of the wall decorations and proportions of the room in which it will be hung. Colors should harmonize—or preferably, complement—the room's motif and both lighting and framing should harmonize with the woodwork!

When you're strolling through the building, Saturday, give a special glance toward:

The fine engraving of Lincoln and his speeches in the probate courtroom.

The Holbein heads... delicate charcoal drawings on tinted paper... in the first floor woman's lounge.

The boldly-colored floral prints in the woman jurors' salon.

The colorful pastels in the supervisors' committee rooms.

The nature scenes capturing deep blues and greens and doing them full justice... and the sea picture in a hand-made frame covered with gold leaf... in the judge's chambers.

The sepia portrait of Judge Samuel G. Houghton in the lawyers' lounge.

Make mental check, too, of the slender frames of wood and slum-inium, used for almost all the pictures and framed by modern decorators as successors to the ornate frames once popular.

REPRESENTATIVES TO VATICAN INCREASED

Six New Cardinals Created In Last Year

VATICAN CITY, March—(UP)—The number of cardinal diplomatic representatives to the Vatican, nunciatures and dioceses was notably increased during 1932, according to official data just made public at the Vatican. The information also concerned the number, status and hierarchical position of the higher dignitaries in the Catholic church.

The sacred college of cardinals is supposed nominally to be composed of 70 members, but this number is seldom maintained. There are at present 56 cardinals, which is three more than at this period last year.

During 1932, three cardinals died and six new ones were created. The cardinals created during 1932 were: Dolci, Fumasoni-Biondi, Foscati, Villeneuve, Dalla Costa and Imbriani. Of the existing cardinals, exactly half are Italian and half are of other nationalities.

Twenty-three are of the curia romana—that is to say, resident in Rome, with some specific appointment—while 33 live out of Italy.

Of the 28 non-Italian cardinals, there are six Frenchmen, four Germans, the four United States cardinals (O'Connell, Dougherty, Mundelein and Hayes), three Spaniards, two Poles, one Belgian, while each of the following nations is represented by one cardinal: Ireland, Hungary, Portugal, Austria, Canada, Brazil, England and Czechoslovakia.

The oldest member of the sacred college is the German cardinal Ehrlich, who is 88; the youngest cardinal is the Italian, who is 45.

During the papacy of Pope Pius XI, 52 cardinals have died.

HORSE BUYING TRADE TAKES ON NEW LIFE

Market Unable To Satisfy All Demands

AMES, Ia., March—(UP)—Old Dobbie, who for years has taken a minor role in the farm drama, is reasserting himself in Iowa as well as in the other farm states of the nation, according to Prof. A. B. Caine of the Animal Husbandry department here.

Professor Caine said that demand has overtaken supply and that horse buyers in all parts of the state are trying to find horses for shipment to eastern farming areas.

He pointed out that market demands have changed greatly in the last ten years, the farm "chuck" and the wagon horse now forming the backbone of the market.

Factors which determine how horses will sell on the market, he said, include type, condition, weight, age, soundness, sex, conformation, color, training, disposition, style, and action.

Say North Ohio Flooded With Counterfeit Bills

CLEVELAND, March—(UP)—Printing press "money" is counterfeited in the greatest volume in recent history, according to federal secret service men.

Fifty hoodlums, squeezed out of bootleg rackets, are being enlisted to the new trade by underworld distributors from the backroom money plants of New York City, the agents assert.

"Bad bills" include all larger denominations, fives, tens, and twenties.

Oil Waste On Water Kills Sea Fowl On West Coast

ROCKAWAY, Ore., March—(UP)—Numerous sea birds are dying here daily from coatings of thick oil which cover their wings.

The oil is waste dumped overboard by freighters. Snipe, mulls, and small gray and white gulls are suffering from the tragedy which seems unavoidable. The birds attempt unsuccessfully to lift their wings before waves sweep over them.

THE TABLE OF COSTS

Here is a table of contracts, disbursements, and balances, due or anticipated, on all accounts of the new Bay county building up to Feb. 28, 1934, as prepared by Joseph C. Goddeyne, architect.

There were additions to the general plumbing and heating, and electrical contracts which, because of their nature or the circumstances surrounding them, cannot justly be called extras, the architect said.

For instance, the \$1,479.81 in additions on the general contract represents \$1,000 which the building committee allowed the contractor for heating the building, in lieu of allowing a lien for delaying the start of construction work, which the architect said, could have been taken against the county. The remainder of the general contract additions were paid only to be included later at the suggestion of the building committee.

The additions to the plumbing and heating contract, \$335, were for the use of copper instead of steel pipes in the branches and rises of the piping system, and several minor alterations which the building committee approved.

In the case of the electrical contract additions, the \$212.90, the architect said, was ordered spent by the building committee to effect certain improvements and changes which probably could not have been foreseen by county officials in making recommendations as to outlets, equipment, etc.

SPIRIT OF BUILDING PART OF FURNITURE

Twenty-Six Designs Drawn For County Unit

The chairs, costumers and davenport in the judge's reception room of the new county building were special creations, incorporating the modern spirit of the structure.

The moldings, readings, legs, arms, and stumps are a repetition of moldings used in the cabinet work. Twenty-six different designs were submitted for figures. These designs included:

DESIGNED TABLES, DESKS TO FIT NEEDS

Architect Provides 20 Different Sizes, Kinds

Desks and tables in the new county building have many features, among them flush moldings, rounded corners and reading legs to match the chairs, said Joseph C. Goddeyne, architect.

Those in the clerical space are a combination of steel and wood with linoleum tops; those in the main offices are wood with diamond matches tops.

Each desk is fully equipped with filing supplies. Many of the desks are of extraordinary width to accommodate several record books. The tables, too, are designed to fit each particular office use. There are 20 different sizes and kinds. Desks, tables and waste baskets in the health unit are black and chrome.

NEWSPAPER REPORTERS' ROOM LOCATED NEAR CIRCUIT COURT

Press Room at the New County Building is Located on the Fourth Floor, Handy to the Main Circuit Courtroom and Judge's Office

The press room at the new county building is located on the fourth floor, handy to the main circuit courtroom and judge's office. Furniture, besides desks and desk chairs, includes four lounging chairs. The room is finished in two shades of green. Two telephone booths are built in the wall while a third is just outside the door.

All chairs in the main circuit courtroom of the new county building are of walnut, specially designed and constructed, and are upholstered in blue leather.

Heavy pads were draped from the tops down and over the floors of the lifts as a precaution against possible marbling of woodwork while furniture and other heavy objects were being taken to their permanent quarters.

Lighting fixtures under the balcony in the main circuit courtroom also serve as ventilators.

Approximately 50 American flags are distributed throughout the new county building. The largest is placed at the left of the judge's bench in the main circuit courtroom.

TWINS SUCCEED EACH IN OFFICES AT SCHOOL


Dress, Courses Alike in College; Presidency of Class Divided Between Them
