

Nonetheless, we continued to focus our efforts on offering vaccinations, investigating outbreaks, and pivoting staff and resources toward more of the essential services that a health department delivers.






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
Lead Screenings

Women, Infants, and Children program is a federally funded program that provides nutritious food, nutrition education and assistance with community referrals for pregnant women, infants, and children under the age of five. Eligibility is at or below 185% of poverty, which serves low-tomoderate-income families who meet income requirements. Families receive nutrition counseling, breastfeeding support and access to other support services offered (in-person and/or remotely) through the health department and local community agencies.





Bay County Health Department partners with the Michigan Department of Health and Human services and the Environmental Protection Agency through the Saginaw Bay Cooperative Agreement grant on the Eat Safe Fish program. The purpose of the program is to create awareness of toxic persistent chemicals in local fish from Tittabawassee River, Saginaw River, and Saginaw Bay through fish advisory education in the form of presentations, community events, and informational brochures distributed to local businesses and physicians.

Manner of Deaths Investigated in Bay County, 2022




Beginning in 2022, the State of Michigan changed all overdose or drug-related deaths from being reported under accidental to undeterminable.
